- a. Auxiliary Report: Kathy Steinkamp, MWSPFPD Auxiliary Treasurer, was absent. Treasurer Costa reported that the Auxiliary will hold the Spaghetti Feed on August 31st and that there will be sign-ups at the Auxiliary meeting on the 14th.
- b. CAL FIRE Report: No report.
- c. Chief's Reports: James Klyn, Fire Chief, reported that E776 broke down on the way to the Boise Fire. It has a cracked head and blown turbo which will take about two weeks to repair at will cost about \$14,000. There are four AED batteries that need to be replaced which cost about \$2000. There was a bear attack which the District responded to and there is a news crew on their way to interview Captain Sedlmeyer. There will soon be four firefighters on every shift and a couple more waiting to fill positions. There is also a new Relief Captain currently out on assignment on E773.

- c. Out-of-District Response Ad Hoc Committee Report; Vice President Doss reported that they have not met yet. They will have a meeting on August 23rd.
- d. Personnel Ad Hoc Committee Report; Vice President Doss said that they did meet but that there is nothing to report at this time.
- e. Discussion regarding the Special District Grant Accessibility Act (SDGAA) (S. 4673) which would codify a formal definition of "special district" and would require the White House Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to issue guidance to federal agencies requiring special districts to be recognized as local governments for the purpose of federal financial assistance determinations; Treasurer Costa explained the bill and the positive impact it would have on potential funding for the District if passed. She will continue to track this.

Capital Improvement Plan FY 25-29

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Introduction to Our Capital Improvement Plan

The Mi Wuk/Sugar Pine Fire Protection District is committed to ensuring the highest level of safety and emergency response for our community. To achieve this, we recognize the importance of strategic planning and investment in our infrastructure, equipment, and resources. The Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) serves as a roadmap for addressing the current and future needs of our fire district, ensuring that we remain well-equipped to handle emergencies effectively and efficiently. The purpose of our CIP is to facilitate capital planning and coordinate financing and scheduling of major capital projects undertake by the District. Please note our CIP does include funding requests for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

The focus of the 2025-2029 CIP is to meet the District's most critical capital needs. This comprehensive plan outlines our priorities for capital investments over the next five years, focusing on key areas such as facility upgrades, apparatus replacement, and personal protective equipment. By systematically planning these investments, we aim to enhance our operational capabilities, create an environment that is supportive of our firefighters, improve response times, and maintain a state of readiness that meets the growing demands of our community.

The development of this CIP involved a thorough assessment of our current assets, identification of critical needs, and consideration of future growth and challenges. Our goal is to ensure that each investment is aligned with our mission to protect lives and property, while also being fiscally responsible and sustainable.

Key highlights of the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan include:

- 1. Facility Upgrades: Renovations and expansions of our fire station to accommodate modern firefighting equipment, provide better working conditions for our personnel, and ensure our facility doesn't put unnecessary stress on our engines and equipment.
- 2. **Apparatus Replacement:** Scheduled replacement of aging fire engines and other equipment to ensure reliability and efficiency in emergency response.
- 3. **Personal Protective Equipment:** Schedule replacement of PPE for our firefighters, specifically boots, helmets, and gloves.

Funding the ambitious initiatives outlined in the CIP will require a multi-faceted approach, as we will need an estimated \$287,014.00 to bring these projects to life. We will pursue multiple sources of revenue, in coordination with the Mi-Wuk/Sugar Pine Fire Protection District Auxiliary, to ensure the successful implementation of this plan, including:

• Targeted Fundraising Campaigns: Organizing community events and campaigns to raise funds and engage local residents in supporting their fire district.

- **Grants:** Actively seeking federal, state, and private grants dedicated to public safety, emergency services, and community resilience.
- **Donations:** Encouraging contributions from individuals, businesses, and philanthropic organizations that share our commitment to public safety.

As we move forward with this plan, we remain committed to transparency and accountability. Regular updates and progress reports will be provided to keep the community informed and engaged in our efforts. The successful implementation of this CIP will ensure that the Mi Wuk Sugar Pine Fire Protection District continues to provide exceptional service and protection to our residents and visitors to our community, now and in the future.

We look forward to embarking on this journey and appreciate the ongoing support and collaboration of our community. Together, we can build a safer, stronger, and more resilient fire district.

About the Mi Wuk Sugar Pine Fire Protection District

The Mi-Wuk Fire Protection District was formed in 1959 as a volunteer fire department. In 1974, it consolidated with the Sugar Pine Fire Protection District to form the Mi-Wuk/Sugar Pine Fire Protection District and now employs four full-time paid firefighters (including it's Fire Chief) and one Office Manager. The District is grateful for its volunteers, which are roughly 22 volunteer firefighters.

The District acts and operates under, and is governed by, the statutory authority known as the Health and Safety Code, State of California, Division 12, Part 2.7, Fire Protection District Law of 1961, currently the Fire District Law of 1987, Senate Bill 515, Chapter 1013, and the revisions of same as adopted by the State. The District is governed by a five-member Board of Directors.

The District covers approximately 1.2 square miles in Tuolumne County and serves approximately 1,500 residences within the communities of Mi-Wuk Village and Sugar Pine along the Highway 108 corridor. It provides additional fire protection and emergency services outside District boundaries through its automatic and mutual aid agreements with the Tuolumne County Fire Department and other surrounding fire districts.

District Mission Statement

The mission of the Mi-Wuk/Sugar Pine Fire Protection District is to serve the residents of and visitors to the communities we serve and to partner with them to provide protection from fire, medical emergencies, and other dangerous conditions.

Detailed Projects

Project Fiscal Year: FY25*

Project Title #1: Exhaust Extraction System for Apparatus Bay

Project Category: Equipment

Anticipated Project Cost: \$20,000.00 (our cost share portion \$3,302.00)

Project Description: The District has applied for a FEMA grant to purchase a new exhaust extraction system for the apparatus bay. If this grant is awarded, the District would be responsible for \$3,302.00

Project Justification and/or Need: Our current exhaust extraction system is outdated and is not optimally effective, leaving potentially dangerous exhaust fumes in our apparatus bay and exposing our firefighters and other District members to these fumes.

Project Benefit: The need for a new exhaust extraction system for our apparatus bay is a safety issue and an important retrofit to our apparatus bay.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source of funding for this project is a FEMA grant. We will cover our cost share through either our operating budget or an Auxiliary contribution.

Operating Budget Impact: This project could impact the operating budget if we are unable to secure a contribution from the Auxiliary.

Project Fiscal Year: FY25

Project Title #2: Remodel of Kitchen and Dining room (including flooring)

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$5,000.00

Project Description: This project would fund the remodeling of our kitchen and dining room. It would include fixing the current structure (walls and ceiling) and replacing some of the flooring.

Project Justification and/or Need: Our current kitchen and dining area is in poor condition with flooring missing in places, creating a potential safety hazard to our District members.

Project Benefit: This project would provide our firefighters with an environment that is safer, more conducive to various activities, and more inviting.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be donations and an Auxiliary contribution, which was approved in 2024.

Operating Budget Impact: This project would not impact our operating budget as we have secured a donation from the Auxiliary.

Project Fiscal Year: FY25

Project Title #3: PPE: Helmets, Boots, and Gloves

Project Category: PPE

Anticipated Project Cost: \$24,602.39 (our cost share portion is \$10,212.00)

Project Description: We have applied for a grant with the California Fire Foundation for replacement PPE (Helmets, Boots, and Gloves) for our firefighters in order to maintain NFPA compliance.

Project Justification and/or Need: NFPA requires helmets be replaced every **10 years** from date of manufacture. In addition, our firefighters are in need of new boots and gloves. Most fire departments either provide a stipend to firefighters for this type of equipment and/or purchase it for them. We, unfortunately, have not had the budget **to** provide this level of commitment on an on-going basis.

Project Benefit: Without new PPE, our firefighters would be unable to serve, significantly impacting our district and neighboring communities. We would also be unable to provide mutual aid or assist with wildland fire strike teams in California. Most importantly, the health and safety of our firefighters would be compromised.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source of funding will be a grant. We will also request an Auxiliary contribution.

Operating Budget Impact: This project would not impact our operating budget.

Project Fiscal Year: FY25

Project Title #4: Remodel of Storage Building

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$15,000.00

Project Description: Our current storage building is in need of a major overhaul. This project

would "rebuild" our storage building.

Project Justification and/or Need: Our current storage building is not only an eyesore in our community but it is literally falling apart. The walls are collapsing and the room is not secure. This room could turn into a state-of-the-art exercise room for our firefighters, but we would like to start small and simply remodel this room by "rebuilding" the **structure**.

Project Benefit: This project would provide us with a space **for** our firefighters to workout as well as provide a modest amount of storage **space**.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be a grant.

Operating Budget Impact: This **project** would not impact our operating budget, as we intend to pursue a grant to cover the **costs** of this project.

Project Fiscal Year: FY26

Project Title #5: Paint Fire Station

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$6,500.00

Project Description: Our fire station is in desperate need of painting. Some parts of the building are chipped and the paint is peeling. We anticipate using volunteers to do the repair work and painting.

Project Justification and/or Need: If we don't fix the walls that need fixing and paint them, the elements will continue to do damage to the structure of our fire station.

Project Benefit: This project would prevent further deterioration and repair costs to the external structure of our fire station.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be donations and/or grants.

Operating Budget Impact: This project would **not** impact our operating fund, as we intend to pursue donations and/or grants **to cover** the costs of this project.

Project Fiscal Year: FY26

Project Title #6: Build New Awning To Join Two Buildings

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$3,000.00

Project Description: Our current awning between the main building and the apparatus bay is not built for an excessive snow load, and it a safety hazard should heavy snow loads fall.

Project Justification and/or Need: If we don't fix the walls that need fixing and paint them, the elements will continue to do damage to the structure of our fire station.

Project Benefit: This project would prevent further deterioration and repair costs to the external structure of our fire station.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be donations and/or grants.

Operating Budget Impact: This project would not impact our operating fund, as we intend to pursue donations and/or grants to cover the costs of this project.

Project Fiscal Year: FY28*

Project Title #7: New Engine

Project Category: Equipment

Anticipated Project Cost: \$20,000.00 (rough estimate of our cost sharing portion)

Project Description: The District has applied for a FEMA grant to purchase a new-to-us 4-wheel drive fire engine. The grant stipulates the District would pay 20% of the total cost of the Engine (with FEMA covering the remaining 80%), assuming the District's grant is approved and funded. This project is focused on raising funds for the 20% we would be responsible for if our request for a grant is approved.

Project Justification and/or Need: We only have one **4-wheel drive** engine that is aging. With age, comes increased repair costs. In addition, NFPA recommends rebuilding an engine after 15 years and retiring engines after 20 years.

Project Benefit: A 4-wheel drive engine is essential in this area, especially during winter conditions. In addition, a 4-wheel drive engine allows us to reach remote conditions that may otherwise not be reachable.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: Mi Wuk Sugar Pine Fire Protection District Operating Budget, Mi Wuk Sugar Pine Fire Protection District Auxiliary Engine Fund, and other grant sources.

Operating Budget Impact: There will be a negligible impact on our operating budget. We anticipate using a portion of strike team money from each deployment from FY 25 through FY28 to raise funds, which means some of the items we usually use strike team revenue from could impact our operating budget. In addition, we are requesting Auxiliary support in raising these funds over the next six years as well through the Auxiliary's Engine Fund (and possible some dedicated fundraising). The Auxiliary's Engine Fund is currently around \$5,000.

Project Title #8: Regrade and Repave Driveway of Fire House

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$200,000.00

Project Description: This project would result in a massive overhaul of our driveway, replacing known hazards and revitalizing it for the future. Our desire is to regrade and repave our driveway.

Project Justification and/or Need: The grading of our current driveway puts additional stress on our engines and it's difficult to plow during winter conditions. In addition, it is a potential hazard during icy conditions.

Project Benefit: The current condition of our driveway is a safety issue and poses potential hazards.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: Fundraising, Auxiliary Contributions, and Donations

Operating Budget Impact: There will be no anticipated impact on our operating budget.

Project Fiscal Year: FY29

Project Title #9: Unanticipated Major Vehicle Repairs

Project Category: Equipment

Anticipated Project Cost: \$20,000.00

Project Description: Unanticipated major vehicle repairs cause a significant challenge to our already tight operating budget. This project would establish a small fund to cover those unanticipated costs, without causing a major disruption to vehicles in service or our ability to respond to various service calls (including strike teams).

Project Justification and/or Need: Our current budget provides little room to create a reserve for unanticipated major vehicle repairs and yet we do **encounter the** need for such repairs.

Project Benefit: This project would help us ensure our entire fleet is always available for the variety of service calls we receive.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be our operating budget; however, we will also pursue fundraising efforts, Auxiliary contributions, and local grant opportunities, if possible.

Operating Budget Impact: This project would impact our operating budget, as we will carve out a fixed amount of money from each year's budget and reassign these funds for these major, unanticipated vehicle repairs.

Project Fiscal Year: FY29

Project Title #10: Carport/Garage

Project Category: Structure

Anticipated Project Cost: \$10,000.00

Project Description: This project would fund the building of a carport/garage to house our equipment that does not fit in our apparatus bay.

Project Justification and/or Need: A good amount of our equipment (e.g., tractor, snow plow, etc.) do not fit in our apparatus bay. As such, they are stored outside in the elements, making them vulnerable to both theft and degradation from weather conditions (e.g., water in the fuel line of our tractor), and thereby creating repairs costs on a regular basis.

Project Benefit: This project would provide us with a space to store our equipment, thereby minimizing repair costs and extending the life of them.

Funding Source(s) for this Project: The primary source will be donations or grants.

Operating Budget Impact: This **project** would not impact our operating budget, as we intend to pursue donations and grants to cover the cost of this project.

2024 Conflict of Interest Code Biennial Notice Instructions for Local Agencies

The Political Reform Act requires every local government agency to review its conflict of interest code biennially. A conflict of interest code tells public officials, governmental employees, and consultants what financial interests they must disclose on their Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700).

By **July 1, 2024:** The code reviewing body must notify agencies and special districts within its jurisdiction to review their conflict of interest codes.

By October 1, 2024: The biennial notice must be filed with the agency's code reviewing body.

The FPPC has prepared a 2024 Local Agency Biennial Notice form for local agencies to complete or send to agencies within its jurisdiction to complete before submitting to the code reviewing body. The City Council is the code reviewing body for city agencies. The County Board of Supervisors is the code reviewing body for county agencies and any other local government agency whose jurisdiction is determined to be solely within the county (e.g., school districts, including certain charter schools). The FPPC is the code reviewing body for any agency with jurisdiction in *more than one county* and will contact them.

The Local Agency Biennial Notice is not forwarded to the FPPC.

If amendments to an agency's conflict of interest code are necessary, the amended code must be forwarded to the code reviewing body for approval within 90 days. An agency's amended code is not effective until it has been approved by the code reviewing body.

If you answer yes, to any of the questions below, your agency's code probably needs to be amended.

- Is the current code more than five years old?
- Have there been any substantial changes to the agency's organizational structure since the last code was approved?
- Have any positions been eliminated or re-named since the last code was approved?
- Have any new positions been added since the last code was approved?
- Have there been any substantial changes in duties or responsibilities for any positions since the last code was approved?

Section 1. Definitions

The definitions contained in the Political Reform Act of 1974, regulations of the Fair Political Practices Commission (2 Cal.Adm. Code Sections 18100, et seq.) and any amendments to the Act or regulations, are incorporated by reference into this Conflict of Interest Code.

Section 2. Designated Employees.

The persons holding positions listed in Appendix "A" are designated employees. It has been determined that these officers and employees make or participate in the making of decisions which may foreseeably have a material effect on financial interests.

Section 3. Disclosure Categories.

Those designated employees, if any, specified in Government Code Section 87200 shall file statements of economic interests pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 7 of the Political Reform Act, Government Code Sections 87200 et seq. 1 With respect to all other designated employees, they shall disclose all those types of economic interests set forth in the latest adopted standard form for statements of economic interests as adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission. It has been determined that the financial interests set forth in a designated employee's disclosure categories are the kinds of

Designated employees who are required to file statements of economic interests under any other Conflict of Interest Code and those Article 2 filers who are designated in this code in a capacity which is in addition to their Article 2 capabilities may file identical expanded statements of economic interests with both entities in lieu of filing separate and distinct statements. Each expanded statement shall be originally signed by the designated employee, and shall include interests made reportable by virtue of both positions.

financial interests which he or she foreseeably can affect materially through the conduct of his or her office.

Section 4. Statements of Economic Interests - Place of Filing.

The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall be the official filing officer. However, all designated employees shall file statements of economic interests with the County Clerk's Office.

Section 5. Statements of Economic Interests - Time of Filing.

(a) <u>Initial Statements.</u> All designated employees employed by the agency on the effective date of this Code shall file statements within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this Code, unless the employee has previously filed a statement pursuant to subdivision (b) or (c).

(b) Assuming Office Statements.

- (1) All persons assuming designated positions after the effective date of this Code which are civil service or merit system positions, shall file statements within thirty (30) days after assuming the designated positions.
- (2) All other persons appointed, promoted or transferred to designated positions after the effective date of the Code, shall file statements within ten (10) days after assuming office, or if subject to confirmation, ten (10) days after being nominated or appointed.
- (c) Annual Statements. All designated employees shall file statements no later than April 1st.

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- (d) <u>Leaving Office Statements</u>. All persons who leave designated positions shall file statements within thirty (30) days after leaving office.
- (e) <u>Candidate Statement</u>. All candidates for election to designated offices other than those specified in Government Code Section 87200 shall file statements within five (5) days after the final date for filing nomination petitions. This subsection shall not apply to candidates who have filed a statement of economic interests with the agency within the previous twelve (12) months.

Section 6. Contents of Statements of Economic Interests.

All statements shall disclose those reportable interests required by the applicable disclosure categories as set forth in Section 3.

Section 7. Manner of Reporting.

Statements of economic interests shall be made on forms prescribed by the Fair Political Practices Commission and supplied by the agency, and shall contain the following information.

- (a) <u>Investment and Real Property Disclosure.</u> When an investment or interest in real property² is required to be reported³ the statement shall contain the following:
 - (1) A statement of the nature of the investment or interest;

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² For the purposes of disclosure only (not disqualification), an interest in real property does not include the principal residence of the filer.

Investments and interests in real property which have a fair market value of less than \$1,000.00 are not investments and interests in real property within the meaning of the Political Reform Act. However, investments or interests in real property of an individual include those held by the individual=s spouse and dependent children as well as a pro rata share of any investment of interest in real property of any business entity or trust in which the individual, spouse and dependent children own, in the aggregate, a direct, indirect or beneficial interest of 10 percent or greater.

- (2) The name of the business entity in which each investment is held, and a general description of the business activity in which the business entity is engaged;
 - (3) The address or other precise location of the real property;
- (4) A statement whether the fair market value of the investment or interest in real property exceeds Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), exceeds Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), or exceeds One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), or exceeds One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00).
- (b) <u>Personal Income Disclosure.</u> When personal income is required to be reported⁴, the statement shall contain:
- (1) The name and address of each source of income aggregating Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or more in value, or Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or more in value if the income was a gift and a general description of the business activity, if any, of each source.
- (2) A statement whether the aggregate value of income from each source was One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or less, greater than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), or greater than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), or greater than One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00);
- (3) A description of the consideration, if any, for which the income was received;

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⁴ A designated employee's income includes his or her community property interest in the income of his or her spouse but does not include salary or reimbursement for expenses received from a state, local or federal government agency.

- (4) In the case of a gift, the name, address and business activity of the donor and any intermediary through which the gift was made; a description of the gift; the amount or value of the gift; and the date on which the gift was received.
- (c) <u>Business Entity Income Disclosure.</u> When income of a business entity, including income of a sole proprietorship, is required to be reported⁵, the statement shall contain:
- (1) The name, address and a general description of the business activity of the business entity;
- (2) The name of every person from whom the business entity received payments if the filer's pro rata share of gross receipts from such person was equal to or greater than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).
- (d) <u>Management Position Disclosure</u>. When management positions are required to be reported, a designated employee shall list the name and address of each business entity in which he or she is a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or in which he or she holds any position of management, a description of the business activity in which the business entity is engaged, and the designated employee's position with the business entity.
- (e) <u>Acquisition or Disposal During Reporting Period.</u> In the case of an annual leaving office statement, if an investment or interest in real property was partially or wholly acquired or disposed of during the period covered by the statement, the statement shall contain the date of acquisition or disposal.

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⁵ Income of a business entity is reportable if the direct, indirect or beneficial interest of the filer and the filers spouse in the business entity aggregates a 10 percent or greater interest. In addition, the disclosure of persons who are clients or customers of a business entity is required only if the clients or customers are within one of the disclosure categories of the filer.

Section 8. Disqualification.

Designated employees must disqualify themselves from making, participating in the making or using their official positions to influence the making of any governmental decision which will foreseeably have a material financial effect, distinguishable from its effect on the public generally, on:

- (a) Any business entity in which the designated employee has a direct or indirect investment worth more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00);
- (b) Any real property in which the designated employee has a direct or indirect interest worth more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00);
- (c) Any source of income, other than loans by a commercial lending institution in the regular course of business on terms available to the public without regard to official status, aggregating Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or more in value received by or promised to the designated employee within twelve (12) months prior to the time when the decision is made; or
- (d) Any business entity in which the designated employee is a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or holds any position of management.

The effects on a designated employee's financial interests of a decision by a landowner voting district to set <u>ad valorem</u> property tax assessments is not distinguishable from the effects such a decision will have on the public generally within such a district. The effects on a designated employee's financial interests of a decision by a utility district to set rates is not distinguishable from the effects such a decision will have on the public generally unless the designated employee's financial interests constitute more than two percent (2%) of the users to whom the rate will be applicable.

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No designated employee shall be prevented from making or participating in the making of any decision to the extent his or her participation is legally required for the decision to be made. The fact that the vote of a designated employee who is on a voting body is needed to break a tie does not make his or her participating legally required for purposes of this section.

Section 9. Manner of Disqualification.

When a designated employee determines that he or she should not make a government decision because he or she has a financial interest in it, the determination not to act must be accompanied by disclosure of the financial interest. In the case of a voting body, this determination and disclosure shall be made part of the agency's official record; in the case of a designated employee who is the head of an agency, this determination and disclosure shall be made in writing to his or her appointing authority; and in the case of other designated employees, this determination and disclosure shall be made in writing to the designated employee's supervisor.

Section 10. Opinions of the Commission and Counsel.

- (a) Any designated employee who is unsure of his or her duties under this Code may request a formal opinion or written advice from the Fair Political Practices Commission pursuant to Government Code Section 83114, or an opinion from the attorney for the agency, provided however that nothing in this section requires the attorney for the agency to issue such an opinion.
- (b) If the designated employee truthfully discloses all material facts, an opinion or written advice provided by the Commission protects the designated employee from administrative, civil and criminal penalties to the extent provided for in Government Code Section 83114. If the designated employee has truthfully disclosed all material facts to the attorney for his or her agency, and an opinion is rendered by the attorney stating in full

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the facts and law upon which the opinion's based, compliance by the designated employee with such opinion may be evidence of good faith in any civil or criminal proceeding brought pursuant to the Political Reform Act, Government Code Sections 81000, et seq. In addition, the designated employee's good faith compliance with the opinion of the attorney for the agency shall act as a complete defense in any disciplinary action the agency may bring under Government Code Section 91003.5.

(c) Copies of any opinion rendered by the attorney for an agency pursuant to this section shall be delivered to the designated employee requesting the opinion and shall be maintained in the files of the agency. Such opinions may subsequently be modified by the attorney for the agency or by the Commission, but such modifications or revisions shall be prospective in effect and shall take effect only after notification has been given the designated employee who requested the opinion.

Section 11. Violations.

This Code has the force and effect of law. Designated employees violating any provision of this Code are subject to the administrative, penal and civil sanctions provided in the Political Reform Act, Government Code Sections 81000 - 91014.

1.04.091 Purpose

Pursuant to the provisions of Government Code sections 87303, 87306 and 87306.5, et.seq. the District hereby adopts the following Conflict of Interest Code. Nothing contained herein is intended to modify or abridge the provisions of the Political Reform Act of 1974. (Government Code Section 81000). The provisions of this code are additional to Government Code Section 87100 and other laws pertaining to conflicts of interest. Except as otherwise indicated, the definitions of said Act and regulations adopted pursuant thereto are incorporated herein and this code shall be interpreted in a manner consistent therewith.

1.04.092 Designated Positions

The positions listed in Section 1.04.097 are designated positions. Officers and employees holding those positions are designated employees and are deemed to make, or participate in the making of, decisions which may foreseeably have material effect on a financial interest.

1.04.093 Disclosure Statements

Designated positions shall be assigned to one or more of the disclosure categories set forth on section 1.04.097. Each designated member shall file an annual statement disclosing that member's interest in investments, real property, and income, designated as reportable under the category to which the member's position is assigned in section 1.04.098.

1.04.094 Place and Time of Filing Leaving office Statement is not included.

- a) All designated members required to submit a statement of financial interests shall file the original with the District, which shall make and retain a copy and forward the original to the County Clerk.
- b) A designated member required to submit a statement of financial interest shall submit an initial statement within 30 days after the effective date of this Code.
- c) Merit system employees appointed, promoted or transferred to designated positions shall file initial statements within 30 days after date of employment.
- d) All other employees appointed, promoted or transferred to designated positions shall file initial statements not less than 10 days before assuming office (or, if subject to confirmation, 10 days before being confirmed), unless an earlier assumption of office is required by emergency circumstances, in which case the statement shall be filed within 30 days thereafter.

- e) Annual statements shall be filed during the month of February by all designated members. This initial statement need not disclose income. Annual statements shall include holdings as of that date and income received and dates of acquisition and disposal of investments and real property which occurred since the filing of the previous statement.
- f) A designated member required to file a statement of financial interest with any other agency, which is within the same territorial jurisdiction, may comply with the provisions of this Code by filing a duplicate copy of the statement filed with the other agency, in lieu of an entirely separate document.

1.04.095 Contents of Disclosure Statements

Disclosure statements shall be made on forms supplied by the Clerk of Tuolumne County, and shall contain the following information:

a) Contents of Investment and Real Property Reports:

When an investment, or an interest in real property, is required to be reported, the statement shall contain:

- 1) A statement of the nature of the investment or interest;
- 2) The name of the business entity in which each investment is held, and a general description of business activity in which the business entity is engaged.
- 3) The address or other precise location of the real property;
- 4) A statement whether the fair market value of the investment, or interest in real property, exceeds ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and whether it exceeds one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). This information need not be provided with respect to an interest in real property which is used principally as the residence of the filer.

b) Contents of Personal Income Reports:

When personal income is required to be reported, the statement shall contain:

- 1) The name and address of each source of income aggregating two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) or more in value, or twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more in value if the income was a gift, and a general description of the business activity, if any, of each source;
- 2) A statement whether the aggregate value of income from each source was greater than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and whether it was greater than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000);

- 3) A description of the consideration, if any, for which the income was received;
- 4) In the case of a gift, the amount and the date on which the gift was received.
- c) Contents of Business Entity Income Reports:

When income of a business entity, including income of a sole proprietorship, is required to be reported, the statement shall contain:

- 1) The name, address, and general description of the business activity of the business entity;
- In the case of a business entity which provides legal or brokerage services, the name of every person who paid fees to the business entity if the filer's pro rate share of fees from such person was equal to or greater than one thousand dollars (\$1,000);
- 3) In the case of a business entity not covered by paragraph (2), the name of every person from whom the business entity received payments if the filer's pro rate share of gross receipts from such person was equal to or greater than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) during a calendar year.
- d) Contents of Management Positions Reports:

When management positions are required to be reported, designated employees shall list the name of each business entity not specified above in which they are a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or in which they hold any position of management.

e) Initial Statement:

The initial statement filed by a member appointed to a designated position shall disclose any reportable investments and interests in real property.

f) Acquisition or Disposal During Reporting Period:

In the case of a statement filed under Section 400 (e), if the investment, or interest in real property, was partially or wholly acquired or disposed of during the period covered by the statement, the date of acquisition or disposal.

1.04.096 Disqualification

Designated members must disqualify themselves from making or participating in the making of any decision in which they have a reportable financial interest, when it is reasonably foreseeable that the decision will have a material financial effect, distinguishable from its effect on the public generally on:

a) Any reportable investment or interest in real property; worth more than \$2000

- b) Any reportable source of income, other than loans by a commercial lending institution in the regular course of business, aggregating two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) or more in value received within twelve months prior to the time the decision is made;
- c) Any business entity in which the designated member is a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or holds any position of management.

Nothing in this Section shall be construed to inhibit or prohibit a designated member from taking appropriate action when confronted with an emergent situation. Employees shall not defer critical decisions to higher authority on the basis of a possible conflict of interest. As soon as practicable following the action, the employee making such decisions shall notify his immediate supervisor in writing of the facts and circumstances surrounding the making of the decision.

1.04.097 Designated Positions

a) CATEGORIES

1) Members, Board of Directors 1-2-3

2) Fire Chief 1-2-3

1.04.098 Categories

a) Category 1

Persons in this category shall disclose all interests in real property within the jurisdiction. "Real property" means any interest or option to purchase an interest in any real property, but does not include a home or property used by the owner primarily for personal or recreational purpose. Real property shall be deemed to be within the jurisdiction if the property or any part of it is within the unincorporated area of Tuolumne County or within the corporate boundaries of any city for which the Office of County Counsel provides primary services.

b) Category 2

Persons in this category shall disclose all investments. Investments means:

Any financial interest in or security issued by a business entity, including but not limited to common stock, preferred stock, rights, warrants, options, debt instruments, if the business entity or any parent, subsidiary or otherwise related business entity has an interest in real property in the jurisdiction, or does business or plans to do business in the jurisdiction, or has done business within the jurisdiction at any time during the two years prior to the time any statement or other action is required under this title. No asset shall be deemed an investment unless its fair market value exceeds one thousand dollars (\$1,000). The term

"investment" does not include a time or deemed deposit in a financial institution, shares in a credit union, any insurance policy, or any bond or other debt instrument issued by any government or government agency. Investments of any individual includes a pro rata share of investments of any business entity or trust in which the individual or spouse owns, directly or indirectly or beneficially, a ten percent interest or greater.

c) Category 3

Persons in this category shall disclose all income, or gifts received from any source located or doing business within Tuolumne County. Income received from a public agency need not be disclosed. For purposes of exemption, the term "income from a public agency" includes County salary and income derived from publically operated schools for teaching or consulting activities.

VEHICLE RENTAL AGREEMENT

This Vehicle Rental Agreement ("AGREEMENT") is entered into this day, September 10, 2024 between Mi Wuk Sugar Pine Fire Protection District ("DISTRICT") and Delfred Carol Dodrill ("OWNER") and shall remain in place until either party terminates the AGREEMENT. This AGREEMENT may be immediately terminated by either party without cause by serving written notice.

Let it be known that this AGREEMENT pertains to one 2008 Ford F350, ICS Type VI, VIN# 1FDWX35R18EA79459, designated as E775 ("E775"), sole property of OWNER.

Let it be known that OWNER has agreed to allow DISTRICT use of E775 within the district for coverage and initial attack purposes on a gratis (no charge) basis except for replenishment of vehicle/fire pump fuels and foam concentrate.

Let it be known that OWNER has agreed to rent E775 to DISTRICT at a discounted daily rental rate (not available to other public agencies) on major incidents. The special DISTRICT rate will be \$75.00 per hour (16-hour daily max) with the understanding that DISTRICT is able to re-bill state and federal agencies at an approximate rate of \$130.00 per hour.

Let it be known that rental of E775 is conditioned on the following:

- (1) MWSP FD Chief Klyn or Assistant Chief Krussow will accompany E775 on assignments as primary operator, and
- (2) operator will receive wages based on the ABH or CFAA agreement in place at that time, as a DISTRICT employee during any assignments.

Let it be known that ABH or CFAS activations would be formally requested and authorized on each occasion by the Fire Chief, or board member designee, of DISTRICT.

Let it be known that, due to an obvious conflict of interest, OWNER will not be able to authorize compensable deployments or other activities personally.

Let it be known that a signed conflict of interest statement form declaring the interest(s) of OWNER is required to be on file and publicly available.

Let it be known that the AGREEMENT does not obligate either party to perform:

- (1) Each opportunity to utilize (i.e. rent) E775 will be conditioned on the best interest of DISTRICT as determined by the Fire Chief, or designee, and
- (2) OWNER may not always be able to make E775 available on short notice and in such a case OWNER may decline an opportunity without penalty or loss of DISTRICT good will.

Let it be known that the DISTRICT with have the responsibility of all insurance accrued on such known vehicle without charge to OWNER.
